# BREEZING, BRACING

... was the venue for the 1980 Conference and Show of the National Association of Wine and Beermakers (NAWB). The Conference centre was the Imperial Hotel, and the Show was staged at the Winter Gardens. Friday afternoon and evening saw a torrent of some 4,251 entries, an increase for the third year in succession (4,117 in 1979).

These came from 436 exhibitors, compared with 398 last year. In the evening Alan Briggs briefed the IOI Judges and their stewards in the Imperial Hotel ballroom.

A social followed, which unhappily became too crowded for comfort; we later learned that the Committee had not been allowed the use of two larger centres as previously arranged.

#### WINE QUEEN

During the evening five lovely ladies competed for the title of National Wine Queen for 1980, the judges' eventual choice being delightful Judith Lloyd of Norton Winemakers. The judges were Mr. Farrow, manager of the Imperial; his Conference secretary Miss Debbie Naylor; Miss Roberts, Head of Boots' Chemists Fashion Department; and Mr. Thornton, Manager of Peter Dominic's Blackpool branch.

## **JUDGING**

The Show judging commenced promptly at 9am on Saturday in the Winter Gardens Horseshoe area, and was comfortably completed by lunchtime. There was adequate space for judging, and ample natural light for most of the morning.

Adrian Mallinson Huddersfield became the new winner of the NAWB Trophy, as the exhibitor gaining most points for wine and beer together; Ken Barnes of Wembley retained the Bournemouth Master Winemaker's Cup, and the Wilf Newsom Cup for the champion brewer went to K. J. Barber of Kent. The coveted "Amateur Winemaker" Shield was won by a club with just 10 out of its 12 members exhibiting, the Tyneside Nationals.

The Show opened for the afternoon with "Judges at the Bar", incorporating a new rule, that a judge could taste a wine with the entrant of that bottle, the

Later in the afternoon members had the opportunity of having their wines assessed and discussed by a panel consisting of the President Leslie Stagg, Past Presidents 'Andy' Andrews, Ben Turner and Fred Bastin, ably assisted by Richard Brooksbank. This was a new venture, with much interesting and informative comment.

The richly decorated Winter Gardens Empress Ballroom was the setting for the Civic Reception and Dance. This was opened by the Deputy Mayor, Mrs. Joan Hunt, JP, as the Mayor and Mayoress were detained by business commitments.

Happily, the Mayor, Councillor Robert C. Dewhirst and his wife the Mayoress were able to arrive shortly afterwards. Everyone enjoyed the buffet supper, the music and dancing, and were appreciative of the hospitality of the Mayor and Mayoress and Blackpool Corporation.

#### **TROPHIES**

Sunday morning came, bright and sunny, and with it the presentation of trophies and awards in the Planet Room, with a remarkable attendance of over 400 enthusiasts. The Mayor presented the trophies, a task becoming ever more arduous as the list of silverware grows. The grand draw was then made by the Mayoress, the premier prize of £100 being won by Mrs. A. Simpson.
