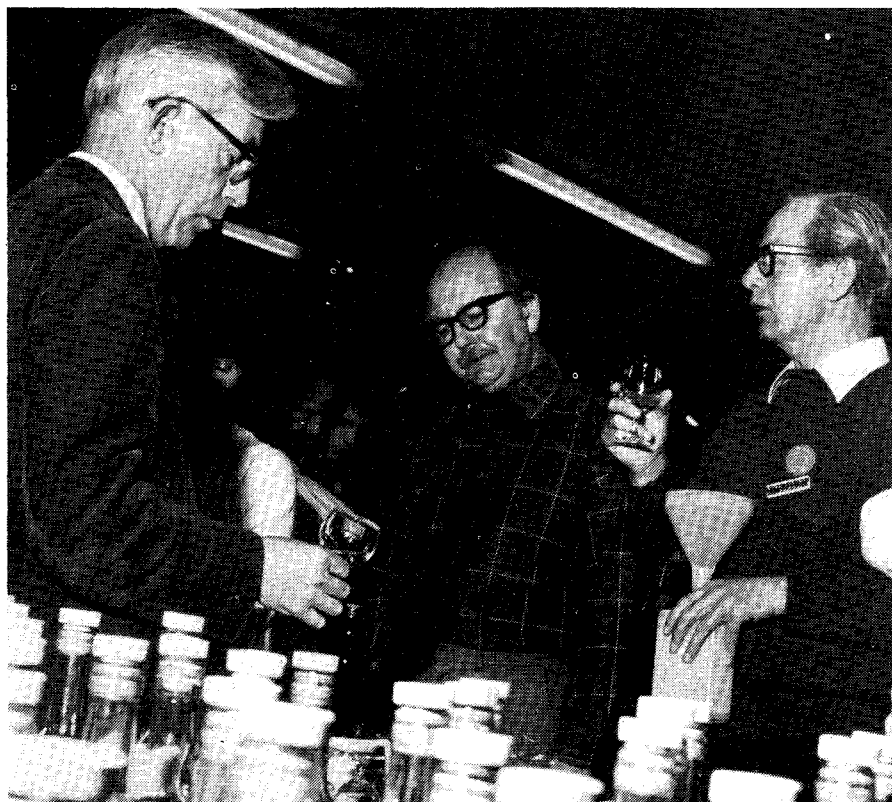


JUDGES IN ACTION

The 23rd Annual **Southern**

. . . or rather, South-Western comfort and hospitality were the keywords for the 1981 National Show and Conference held at Exeter University on March 25th, 26th and 27th. Nearly 450 enthusiasts enjoyed the stay in the Birks Halls of Residence, with all the inevitable wisecracks! From there a steep climb, quickly dubbed 'cardiac hill', led to the Great Hall, where all the weekend's official activities took place; 436 exhibitors entered, precisely the same as last year, but the number of exhibits dropped from 4,251 to 3,437.

Maurice Matthews, convenor, briefed the 95 judges and their stewards on Friday evening. A social evening followed, during which five brave and beautiful ladies contended for the title of National Wine Queen 1981. The sash and crown were awarded to attractive Susan Slydel of Poole Circle, presented to her by the host for the occasion, Andy Craig-Rich, the locally well-known Western television and radio personality; the judges were Mrs Craig-Rich, Mr J. F. Landers, leader of Exeter City Council, and Mr D. Baker, editor of the 'Express' and 'Echo' newspapers.

Judging of the wines, beers, and other exhibits on Saturday morning took place quite appropriately in the lower examination hall, which was spacious, reasonably well-lit, and amply supplied with tables and chairs.

NAWB and other 'Masters'

K. J. Barber of Kent gained the NAWB Trophy for most points for wine and beer classes combined; the Bournemouth Master Winemakers Cup went to R. Jenkins, also of Kent; and the Wilf Newsom Cup for the most successful beermaker was awarded to J. S. Parkin. That proficient specialist group, Ace of Clubs, bounced back into the

limelight to take the 'Amateur Winemaker' Shield, as the club with most points overall. The gallant Tyneside Nationals were runners-up for the second year running, taking the Nottingham Trophy once more.

The Show opened in the afternoon with judges at the bar, answering questions from a large number of exhibitors. Trade stands helped provide interest, representing Colley pumps and siphons, Munton & Fison, the Suffolk producers of Muntona malts, Boxes for Winemakers – and children's lunch boxes too – and a local winemaking and brewing supplies shop, Messrs Dymond & Smith of Exmouth, who carry an excellent wide range; plus of course, the NAWB shop for ties, souvenir wineglasses and other goods and the annual tombola with hundreds of prizes.

GUEST SPEAKER

The guest speaker, Mr Ken Barrell, BEM, of Leeds, talked to a small but appreciative audience on public speaking. Those who attended were well rewarded, being both entertained and instructed by one who is clearly a master of his art.

Saturday evening's entertainment was a carnival dance, with a loud and lively pop group, and a fancy dress parade, won by two of Darth Vader's black-garbed spacemen; beneath the disguise they proved to be Kevin and Gwen Murray from Newton Abbott Circle. The first prize in the raffle, a portable TV set, went to a delighted Mrs Lee of Enfield. Altogether a very enjoyable evening.

AWARDS CEREMONY

A good crowd turned out on Sunday morning for the distribution of awards to successful exhibitors, by Mrs Sybil Hill, chairman. This lengthy process – there are now 40 trophies to be won – was followed by the grand draw, drawn by Ben Turner, a past president and a founder member. The first prize, of £100, was won by a lucky person from Langley, Eastbourne, by the name of Leggatt.

AGM

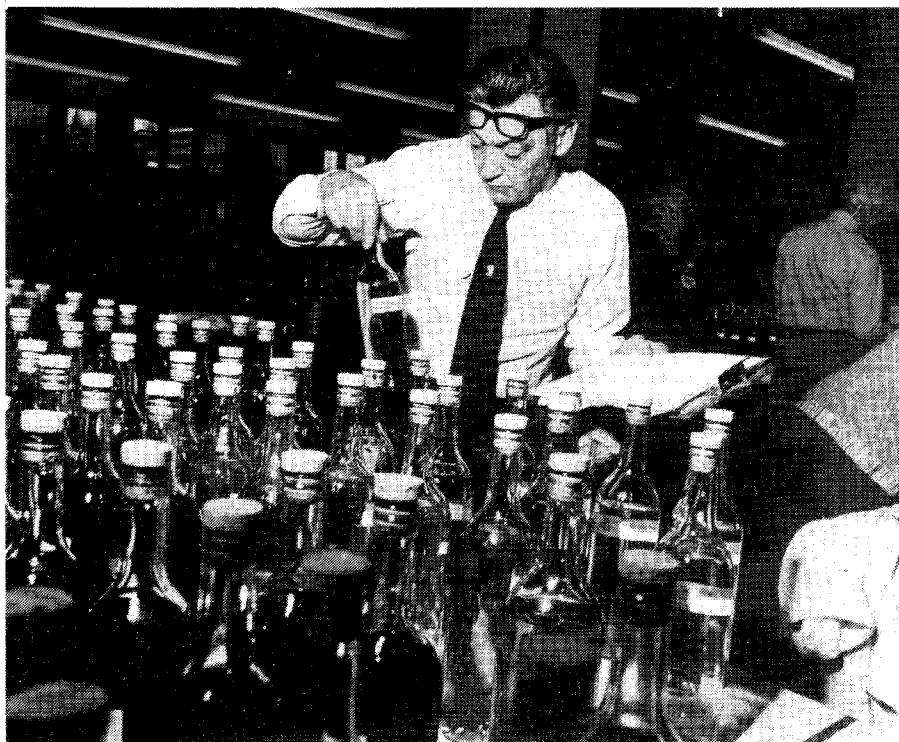
After a short break the hall was reoccupied by members and representatives for the Association's AGM. Unfortunately the president, Leslie Stagg had been taken ill just a few days previously and Mrs Hill spoke on his behalf; all present were pleased to hear that he was making a rapid recovery, but sadly he was unable to attend the last day of his presidency. Apologies were tendered for several other absent members. The chairman's report commented on the difficulty of getting schedules from the printers – this year's had arrived on Christmas Eve – and the care needed to ensure that the National Show and Conference did not end up with a large financial loss. He also announced that the 1982 Conference would be at Scarborough, where it would be warmly welcomed. Mrs Hill exhorted all members to try to engender enthusiasm for the National Association

among their fellow hobbyists and Circles, and to start planning now to attend in 1982.

Peter Awbery, treasurer, then discussed the accounts, followed by Mrs Hill introducing each member of the Committee in turn and outlining the work they did for the Association. Doug Ives, general secretary, conducted the elections, resulting in his wife Margery being elected to represent the Circles and Dave Pulley of Bromley to stand for the Federations. George Christmas and Ken Hill retired from the committee and the other members were returned unopposed.

The motions on the agenda were all passed, with slight alteration to the wording of one: subscriptions were raised to £4.40 single and £7.80 married couple; small alterations to the constitution and rules were accepted. Each member is to receive, in due course, a copy of the revised constitution

After Roy Butcher, vice-chairman, thanked Mrs Hill for all her work both on behalf of the president and as chairman, Ken Hill was declared new president of the Association, with the approval of all present. Ken spoke a few words of appreciation and thanks, saying he would do his best to uphold the high traditions of past presidents, particularly Leslie Stagg, his immediate predecessor. Wishing all a safe journey home, he then closed the Conference. So ended another memorable weekend.
